On our first Sunday of the year, we received "Star Words" during the service, a tradition of which I was just recently made aware. These printed words may serve to remind us of a theme to guide us for 2024.

On our second Sunday, we ordained Pam Hooper to the office of deacon, and installed her along with deacons Ginger Gmahling, Debbie Lundberg, and elders John Girton and Nancy Rademacher for the Class of 2026. We are off to a great start to the new year!

We are looking forward to hosting Rev. Charlotte Cramer, Chaplain for the San Rafael Street Chaplaincy, for an inaugural Homelessness Education Workshop. The forum will begin Thursday, January 25 from 4-5pm, and continue for the next 4 Thursdays through February 22. The purpose of the workshop is to help us come to a deeper understanding of what homelessness is, what causes it, and the ways we can participate in community healing through compassionate presence.

The workshop will help us to:

- compassionately explore and rewrite judgements, narratives and physiological/emotional responses that exist within us and our culture.
- educate us on the realities of trauma, mental illness, addiction/substance abuse, and how all of these interplay into homelessness.
- illuminate the realities and experiences in the life of an unhoused individual.

We hope that you will be able to join us for this experience Rev. Cramer has prepared for us. She is launching the program with us at Redwoods, and hopes that it might become a program she can present at other churches and organizations. I am touched to reflect that Charlotte manifested this idea after serving as our guest preacher this past November. She said afterward that Redwoods was the most receptive church she had ever encountered. She was inspired by the congregation's receptivity and hospitality to launch this series on Homelessness.

Thank you for being this church, one of receptivity, and may we continue with this outlook as we journey together in the new year.

Disaster Relief for Israel & Palestine

As violence escalates in and around Israel/Palestine, PDA is providing humanitarian assistance through partners on the ground and through ACT Alliance. (ACT Alliance is a global alliance of more than 145 churches and related organizations from over 120 countries created to provide humanitarian aid for poor and marginalized people. 76% of its member organizations are rooted in the global south, 22% in the global north and 2% have a global presence.)

PDA has approved solidarity grants and will continue supporting our partners providing humanitarian assistance. Our response efforts will encompass a wide array of vital humanitarian interventions, including but not limited to medical supplies, shelter, WASH (water, sanitation and hygiene), food and non-food items and delivering crucial psychosocial support to individuals.

The Story Behind the Carol

O holy night! The stars are brightly shining, It is the night of our dear Saviour's birth. Long lay the world in sin and error pining, Till He appear d and the soul felt its worth. A thrill of hope, the weary world rejoices, For yonder breaks a new and glorious mom. Fall on your knees! O hear the angel voices! O night divine, O night when Christ was born: O night divine, O night, O night Divine.

Led by the light of Faith serenely beaming,
With glowing hearts by His cradle we stand.
So led by light of a star sweetly gleaming,
Here come the wise men from the Orient land.
The King of Kings lay thus in lowly manger;
In all our trials born to be our friend.
He knows our need, to our weaknesses no stranger,
Behold your King! Before Him lowly bend! (repeat)

Truly He taught us to love one another;
His law is love and His gospel is peace.
Chains shall He break for the slave is our brother;
And in His name all oppression shall cease.
Sweet hymns of joy in grateful chorus raise we,
Let all within us praise His holy name.
Christ is the Lord! O praise His Name forever,
His power and glory evermore proclaim. (repeat)

In 1847, a French priest commissioned this beloved song for his parish. Lyricist Placide Cappeau finished his poem, and pleased with his work, he asked Adolphe Charles Adams to compose the music. The song was sung for Christmas Eve mass.

Initially, Cantique de Noel (the song's French name was widely loved. Later, leaders learned Cappeau was a socialist and Adams a Jew— and the song was banned from services. But the French people loved it so much, they continued to sing it.

Ten years later, John Sullivan Dwight introduced it in America. An abolitionist, he was moved by the third verse. (Chains shall he break for the slave is our brother). Although banned in France, Cantique de Noel became popular with Americans.

On Christmas Eve in 1871, in the midst of fierce fighting between France and Germany during the Franco-Prussian War, an unarmed French soldier jumped out of the trenches, walked onto the battlefield, and started singing the song's first line in French. After singing all three verses, a German solider emerged and started singing a sacred German hymn. Fighting stopped for the next 24 hours in honor of Christmas Day. Temporary peace was initiated by O Holy Night.

Fast forward to 1906. Reginald Fessenden figured out that by combining two frequencies, radio could do more than transmit Morse code. It would be possible to speak! For the first time in history, a human voice was heard on the airwaves; Fessenden read the Christmas story from the book of Luke, then picked up his violin and performed O Holy Night.

Lenten Prayers to End Hunger: Bread of the World

Jesus said to [the woman at the well], "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." — John 4:13-14

Nearly 15 percent of U.S. households — more than 40 million Americans, including 12 million children — struggle to put food on the table. Here the measure of hunger is "food insecurity" — an ongoing uncertainty of where the next meal will come from. More than 1 in 5 U.S. children are at risk of hunger. To the surprise of many, most Americans (51.4 percent) will live in poverty at some point before age 65.

Advocating for this ongoing issue, Bread for the World urges U.S. decision makers to do all they can to pursue a world without hunger. Their mission is to educate and equip people to advocate for policies and programs that can help end hunger in the U.S. and around the world.
