

Grace and Peace to Redwoods Presbyterian Church!

We have been doing a lot of "Fall cleaning up and cleaning out" at the church lately. In the midst of our cleaning, some relics have been discovered.

First, when cleaning out the kitchen, a list was found from 1965 of the number of each item in our cabinets: 87 teaspoons; 114 forks, 120 knives, 134 salad plates; 135 cups and saucers; 135 dinner plates... plus a list of every item in the kitchen from cake plates to frying pans. The Deacons and others put in a great deal of effort to sort through all the items and discern what was still needed, and what, that we no longer used, could be donated. The items were placed on the tables in Fellowship Hall for people to take as they liked.

Make It Home in San Rafael was the recipient of our remaining no-longer-needed dishes. This organization furnishes homes of those in need with donated furniture and household goods, solving 2 problems at the same time: collecting, repurposing and curating gently used furnishings and household goods (saving them from the landfill) and giving them to people in need. With the homes created, tons of furnishings are kept out of landfills, showing care for community and environment. Make It Home is a Certified California Green Business. We also donated items to St. Patrick's Thrift Shop in Larkspur.



Second, when cleaning out the bell choir closet, another list was found, taped to the inside cabinet door where communion items were kept, atop the communion preparation instructions. It was dated 1984 and showed the number of communion cups used each month during the year (a high of 130 in Dec. 1984 and low of 76 in August 1985).

Also, in the communion cabinet was a wooden communion tray with a lid, labeled, "FIRST SET USED BY THE CHURCH," which, when lifted, showed an array of elegant glass communion cups and an engraved silver plate dated of Nov. 5, 1895. We used this tray on Sunday, October 1, for World Communion Sunday, also the day of receiving the Peace and Global Witness Offering. It serves as a reminder of the 127 years that Redwoods Presbyterian Church has been a witness to global peacemaking.

As many noted in the cleaning, we are now lighter, more spacious, less weighed down and more open for newness with room for the Spirit to move. It can be challenging to let go, yet knowing that others in need will be using what we cherish but no longer use is a blessing.

#### **Deacon's Corner**

"Celestial Communion"

Whenever you eat this bread and drink this cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he come. — 1 Corinthians 11:26

When Apollo 11's *Eagle* lunar module landed on the moon's Sea of Tranquility on July 20, 1969, the space travelers took time to recover from their flight before stepping onto the moon's surface. Astronaut Buzz Aldrin had received permission to bring bread and wine so he could take Communion. After reading Scripture, he tasted the first foods ever consumed on the moon. Later he wrote: "I poured the wine into the chalice our church had given me. In the one-sixth gravity of the moon the wine curled slowly and gracefully up the side of the cup." As Aldrin enjoyed this celestial Communion, his actions proclaimed his belief in Christ's sacrifice on the cross and guarantee of His second coming.

The apostle Paul encourages us to remember how Jesus with His disciples "on the night he was betrayed" (1 Corinthians 11:23). Christ compared His soon-to-be-sacrificed body to the bread (v.24). He declared the wine as a symbol of "the new covenant" that secured our forgiveness and salvation through His blood shed on the cross (v.25). Whenever and wherever we take Communion, we're proclaiming our trust in the reality of Jesus' sacrificed and our hope in His promised second coming (v.26).

No matter where we are, we can celebrate our faith in the one and only risen and returning Savior – Jesus Christ – with confidence.


### **Compassionate Kids!**

# **Peace and Global Witness Offering**

You shall go out in joy and be led forth in peace. — Isaiah 55:12



"The Peace & Global Witness Offering encourages the church to cast off anxiety and fear, discord and division, and embrace God's mission of reconciliation to those around the corner and around the world.

Through the Peace & Global Witness Offering, congregations are encouraged and equipped to find and address the anxiety and discord that is prevalent throughout this broken world.

A gift to the Peace & Global Witness Offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of

conflict and injustice across the world. Individual congregations are encouraged to utilize up to 25% of this Offering to connect with the global witness of Christ's peace. Mid councils retain an additional 25% for ministries of peace and reconciliation. The remaining 50% is used by the Presbyterian Mission Agency to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence, including our own, through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness." \*

The Mission/Outreach Committee at Redwoods has voted to send the local portion of the offering to the Center for Domestic Peace. The Center not only provides shelter and respite for people fleeing domestic violence, they also provide counseling and training for people who need to learn to cease being violent. We invite you to join us in our peacemaking in our community.
