From The Rev. Cornel Barnett

Dear Friends,

Happy New Year! I trust you had a meaningful Christmas. This is indeed a most wonderful time of the year. I'm actually writing this letter before Christmas.

Most of you know that I made an emergency trip to South Africa recently to officiate at the memorial service of my Uncle Charlie. It was a worthwhile visit. When I take trips outside of my zone I encounter all kinds of "non-religious" or non-churched people and family and friends who are interested in spiritual matters and especially the church.

I spoke with a man on the plane from London to San Francisco who told me that he wasn't "religious" and encouraged me to "imagine there's no religion." I replied that this line by John Lennon was trite and superficial and added that the meaning of religion is "to bind," to bind up wounds and to bind people into a community of meaning and compassion. The world of religions is too vast and deep to be so easily dismissed.

People are legitimately concerned about religion's restrictiveness and religion's engagements in war and conflict. We, too, are critical about this especially when we know of religion's capacity to free us in soul, mind and body and we know, too, that people often confuse religion with political ideology and political ideology's use of religion to foment conflict. It's not simple.

The church really is a valuable community of folk caring and supporting each other, especially in the US culture that has lifted up individualism and has thus isolated people from each other. The church provides community that's been lost from more communally-based cultures.

The church helps us to get out of ourselves, especially in our worship of God who holds the earth and stars and universe together. Through worship and education, the church helps us to build a better world, to be more about love, compassion, peace and justice. The church supports a mission-mindedness where we are concerned about the well-being of the world and all in the world.

One doesn't throw away one's minds when one believes. We value science and all that science brings, and we value the loving, caring energy behind it all that we call God.

We affirm that God came powerfully among us in the person of Jesus Christ who showed the way to all the good things about our faith and promised that the Holy Spirit would be with us in his stead, to enable us to live his life through our own personalities and in our own walks of life. Somehow God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit form a unity. It's difficult to explain this oneness and yet we believe it so, and it inspires our lives.

Bottom-line, the church – and religion – enable us to be fully alive and excited about life. God bless you as you move into this New Year and as we grow together as God's church here in this beautiful part of God's world.

News from the Deacons From Deacon Elein Phipps

Over the last two months, on behalf of the Redwood Deacons, I have asked the following question in the LOG, "Have you thought about what you would do if an earthquake or other disaster happened here in Marin?"

I also let you know about "Get Ready Marin," a countywide disaster preparedness program that emphasizes the critical importance of the ability of Marin residents to survive in their homes for 72 hours following a disaster, and I noted that this first line of defense, called "Shelter in Place," is expected to save more lives than any other personal preparedness effort.

As a Deacon concerned about the welfare of our congregation, I was happy to pass along the information from "Get Ready" that says we must prepare mentally (know what to do) and prepare physically (assemble supplies) to be able to survive a serious disaster. "Get Ready" recommends that to get started you should take a class and then follow up by gathering what you will need. I passed along the recommendation to find class times and supplies at www.getreadylarkspur.org and to click on "Take a class" or "Download materials" at that site to get all the information you needed.

But wait, did you take those recommended steps? Did you take a class and gather all the supplies you needed? If you did, congratulations! If you did not, please take advantage of the opportunity the Redwoods Deacons is providing to congregation members and friends, a special class just for you immediately after the 10 am Sunday worship service on January 29.

Support for Women

The following article comes from the Leadership Conference of the PCUSA Office of Presbyterian Women.

“The Convention of the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW) is a landmark international agreement that affirms principles of fundamental human rights and equality for women around the world.

To date, 186 out of 192 United Nations member states have ratified CEDAW. The United States is one of only seven countries – including Iran, Sudan, Somalia, and three small Pacific Island nations (Nauru, Palau and Tonga) – that have not ratified CEDAW.

Ratifying the CEDAW treaty would continue the U.S.’s proud bipartisan tradition of protecting human rights. Ratification required 67 senators to stand together for women and has no additional financial cost. Around the world, CEDAW has been used to reduce sex trafficking and domestic abuse; provide access to education and vocational training; ensure the right to vote; improve maternal health care; ensure the ability to work without discrimination; end forced marriage; and ensure inheritance rights.

Ratifying CEDAW would strengthen the United States as a global leader in standing up for women and girls.” For more info, see www.ratifiedaw.org.
