Mission Outreach Committee News

Pentecost Offering

We join other generous congregations to support groups providing assistance to children at risk through the Presbyterian Church (USA) Pentecost Offering. Local congregations retain 40% of the funds received to support local groups. This year the Mission Outreach Committee has selected CASA to be the recipient of our funds. The Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) program advocates for the best interests of children who are dependents of the Marin Juvenile Court, helping to ensure they have a chance to live in a safe and permanent home.

Peacemaking Offering

We will receive this year's Peacemaking Offering on October 2, which is World Communion Sunday. This offering supports the Presbyterian Church's commitment of peacemaking as part of our faithfulness to God. The local church retains 25 percent of the offering for local programs, 25 percent is used by presbyteries and synods and 50 percent goes to the Presbyterian Church (USA)'s Peacemaking Program.

This year's theme is: "A harvest of justice is sown in peace." (James 3:18). The PC (USA) says, "The God who grants peace and wholeness calls Christians to understand and address the root causes of violence and injustice so that we may share in mending the brokenness that exists in our increasingly conflict-ridden and fragmented world. Peacemaking is the human response to God's gift of peace giving." Amen.

Bread for the World Offering off Letters

This year, the BFW Offering of Letters will take place on Sunday, October 16 following worship. Information about the offering and sample letters will be available following worship on Sunday, October 2 and writing will take place on October 9. I recently received an e-mail from David Gist, California Regional Organizer, who shared the following: "If people assume our senators will protect hungry people and programs that

affect vulnerable people, please inform them that aides to both our senators told us and other advocates earlier this year that the senators were fine with across the board cuts and thus weren't planning to make protecting poor people a priority...so we do need to press them to do the right thing about poor people." Wow! Our letter writing is vital. Thanks in advance for your support.

At the September Presbytery meeting, I had the pleasure of meeting the new president of the San Francisco Theological Seminary, The Rev. Dr. James McDonald, who before coming to SFTS, spent 13 years building a broad movement against hunger and poverty for Bread for the World, a faith-based advocacy organization in Washington, D.C. I am not sure he will be able to join us on October 9, but I sure hope we have lots and lots of letters to be blessed!

Alternative Christmas Faire

The Alternative Christmas Fair will be held following the worship service on Sunday, November 20. The Mission Outreach Committee is hard at work preparing for the event. To make the fair even better, we are asking if any one would like to sponsor a table to support a worthy group. Just contact one of the Mission Committee members who will provide help and assistance. This truly is a case of "the more the better!" This year we are planning to expand the fair by having some actual items from the Fair Trade Program.

Counseling Corner

From Suellen Barnett, MA, LMFT

I think I have talked with some of you about the Mid-western philosophy of “Expecting the worst, but hoping for the best.” The former director of Aldea, who was Jewish and grew up in Brooklyn, said his family had much the same philosophy as those farmers in Indiana. He said to me one time, “Let’s get rid of negative thinking, Suellen. No more fear-based living!” I said, “Yes!” But it’s hard to get that negativity totally out of one’s psyche, especially when very difficult things come up.

Our Christian faith says a lot about leaning into the positive. Philippians says “I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me” and in Proverbs “Commit to God whatever you do and all your plans will succeed,” and much, much more.

Whatever happens, it just helps us to lean into the light rather than the dark. On October 15, I’m going to attend a workshop in Berkeley called “The Science of a Meaningful Life: Taking in the Good” given by neuropsychologist and a physician. They say that attendees will learn the following:

- Identify ways the brain has a negativity bias and the effects that has on our well-being. (This reminds me of a Scottish minister in South Africa, pastor of the church we attended in Pietermaritzburg. He said human beings have an inclination toward the dark side like an English bowling ball has a bias in one direction, even if you throw it straight ahead. But he also said through worship, study and community we can learn to lean into the light.)

- Review steps for internalizing positive experiences in memory systems

- Practice concrete strategies for boosting positive experiences while reducing the effects of negative ones

- Develop neurophysiological strategies for shifting

emotion away from worry toward gratitude (Cornel spoke on gratitude a short time ago and its importance in our Christian walk.)

I’ll share some of what I learn in next month’s Counseling Corner. In the meantime, let’s practice leaning toward the light, seeing the positive even in some of the tough situations that all of us face, and trusting that God will help us succeed. **Suellen**
